In October, we received wonderful news! Seattle Opera was nominated for a 2023 International Opera Award for the world premiere of *A Thousand Splendid Suns*. The awards celebrate opera talent from around the world and raise funds to support aspiring artists. The nominees come from 26 countries, representing companies, productions, and artists across Europe and North America joined as well as from Australia, the Democratic Republic of Congo, Mexico, South Africa, Korea, and Guatemala.

We were nominated along with world premiere productions from several European opera companies, San Diego Opera, and Metropolitan Opera.

The nomination recognizes our total passion and dedication to the masterpiece created by Sheila Silver, Stephen Kitsakos, Khaled Hosseini, and Roya Sadat. Furthermore, the nomination also serves as a tribute to you and your support of Seattle Opera.

WELCOME TO THE OPERA CENTER

On Saturday, September 23, the Opera Center was abuzz as over 650 people filled the building for our annual Open House. Visitors were treated to a smorgasbord of operatic delights, including performances by Lowbrow Opera Collective and Seattle Opera's resident artists; tours of the costume shop, props department, and Classical KING studios; and a Q&A with *X*: *The Life and Times of Malcolm X* composer Anthony Davis. The energy was palpable as guests received a behind-the-scenes look at the complex machine required to put an opera on stage.

This year's Open House felt extra special as it coincided with the start of our 60th anniversary season. The day's festivities had an air of reflection: longtime Seattle Opera patrons shared their favorite operagoing memories as they perused a stunning exhibit showcasing Seattle Opera's 60-year history and listened to dramaturg Jonathan Dean's presentation on Seattle Opera milestones.

The highlight of the day, however, was seeing the many faces of our community come together to celebrate art. Displays from community partners including Tasveer, Seattle Rep, Arte Noir, and Path with Art demonstrated the interconnectivity of Seattle's arts community. By opening our doors and sharing our work with our audiences, Seattle Opera renewed our commitment to creating top-quality art with and for our community. ARTIST Showcase

Seattle Opera is honored to welcome soprano Camille Ortiz and baritone Michael J. Hawk, our first pair of Resident Artists, to the staff. As Resident Artists, they are salaried for an entire season, with multiple opportunities to perform. While with the company, Camille and Michael will receive professional development, mentoring, and the stability of a long-term partnership with us. Just several days ago, Camille and Michael presented an artist's recital in Tagney Jones Hall. They performed works by Richard Strauss, Sergei Rachmaninoff, Ambroise Thomas, Ernesto Cordero, and Richard Rodgers and Oscar Hammerstein, which were well received by the audience. In addition to covering roles throughout the season, both will sing at our 60th Anniversary Concert & Gala.



MICHAEL J. HAWK

Michael is a graduate of LA Opera's Young Artist Program, and his recent schedule has included appearances with LA Opera, Santa Fe Opera, and the Buffalo Philharmonic. Michael will perform with Seattle Opera through the end of the 2023/24 season, covering the role of Figaro in *The Barber of Seville*. Michael hails from Upstate New York.

CAMILLE ORTIZ

Camille is a native of Puerto Rico and currently serves as Assistant Professor of Voice at the University of Oregon. She has appeared with Opera Lafayette at the Kennedy Center, Opera Orlando, and Boston Baroque. Camille's time with us will run through the end of this calendar year, but we look forward to seeing and hearing her again at the anniversary concert in May.

THOUGHTS FROM The creators of X

Anthony Davis on the genesis of composing X:

The idea started when my brother Kip [Christopher Davis] was in a play called El Hajj Malik, performing as Malcolm X. He thought we could create a musical based on Malcolm's life. The autobiography [The Autobiography of Malcolm X by Alex Haley] had so many references to music, particularly during his time in Boston when he was working in clubs and dance halls. Kip's idea was to tell this story using jazz, say from the forties to the sixties, et cetera. I was intrigued that it should be an opera with Malcolm as a tragic hero. I studied a lot of Wagner when I was in school. I also read Nietzsche's and Kierkegaard's ideas about opera. That's what got me really interested writing an opera."

Robert O'Hara's guiding vision to directing *X*:

For me, the opera is about everyone. There's a Malcolm X Boulevard in almost every city. And so there are people who look like us, who walk down those streets, who look up at the sign and think about how that name got there and how they fit into the story of that man. Malcolm's legacy has been told in many forms—documentary, film, book, and quite a few plays. Opera is new to his biography. There is great responsibility to embody the way in which he lived and the things that he fought for.

"When I think about Seattle, I think about the various political movements and activism there. I think of many ways the community makes their opinions heard.... I have heard of [folks in] Seattle shutting things down. I think Malcolm would be right in line with that. Any experience of his life should take that into account. For me this opera isn't a biography of Malcolm X, it is an experience of Malcolm X."

Kenneth Kellogg on portraying Malcolm X:

I am not going to try to take on his persona. I can't. I'm concentrating on his message and what he stood for. I also think about how his message resonates in my life. And I think about what Malcolm's message means for today's audiences. I try to carry those ideals into how I prepare for the role. It affects how I sing."
